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
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Ask the Retirement Thomas A. Gray, MBA Thomas A. Gray, MBA

A. By the end of the first quarter of the year following the year that you become 70.5 years of age, you must make your first "Required Minimum Distribution" RMD from your IRA.

How do I calculate the amount of the RMD that I must withdraw?

A. The calculation is based upon the following factors: 1) The value of your IRA at the end of the previous year, and 2) Your age and an IRS table showing the percent that must be taken.

What if I forget to withdraw the minimum RMD?

A. Try not to do this. The penalty is 50% of the amount not taken!

Q. If inflation averages 5%, how much will I need in the future?

A. Let's assume you retire at age 60, and need \$4000 per month in retire-



ment income. If inflation is 5%, then at age 65 you will need \$5,105 to buy the same goods and services. At age 70, this amount will rise to \$6,515. By age 70 you will need a whopping \$8,315 just to stay even! This is the reason we often recommend equity investments to those well into retirement striving to stay well ahead of inflation.

Q. I've always liked real estate as an investment. Should I own rental property in retirement?

A. Real estate investments may be appropriate for their income and long-term appreciation potential. However, we find that many retirees do not want the burdens of management, etc. If this is the case, consider REIT's – Real Estate Investment Trusts. Many REIT's can be purchased similarly to a stock, have ready liquidity, and no "hands on" management!

O. Should I have a living trust?

A. The answer is maybe. You need to speak to an estate planning attorney who can assess your assets, liabilities, and consider all factors that may indicate a need for this trust. Tax laws were recently

passed that greatly increased the amount you can pass estate tax free. However, you may want to consider other estate planning techniques such as power of attorney for financial and medical contingencies.

What are the biggest mistakes that retirees make?

A. Unfortunately, many retirees just don't have an overall financial strategy. This sometimes leads to "over spending", or "under-spending" as a result. Also, many newly retirees are far too conservative with their investments—preferring bank CD's and other low yielding investments. Remember, someone retiring at age 65 may have 30 or more years in retirement, and you should invest to stay ahead of inflation!

WHAT'S MY HOME WORTH?

We get this question all the time. Frankly, on a day like today (written on March 31, 2011), the sun is out and the temperature is 84 degrees and the dolphins are playing in the surf, the answer would have to be, *priceless*. However, we all want to know that our largest investment (for most of us) is holding up OK given the battering real estate has taken over the past several years. Our last newsletter had a 10-year breakdown of average sales prices from 2000 to present.

As you see from the chart, if you bought in 2000 and still own the home today, your average price has basically doubled. We thought it would be interesting to compare percent increases of four types homeowners. This may help us all look at the "Big Picture" of long term homeownership.



- An original owner who bought their home brand new in 1954.
- 2. A baby-boomer who bought in 1975.
- An average homeowner who bought in 1995.
- 4. A newer Riviera homeowner who bought in 2005.

Here is what we found based on 1st quarter 2011 average sales price of \$918,812

Purchased Home	Average sales price	% Appreciation from then to now
1954	\$15,000	+ 6026%
1975	\$71,920	+ 1178%
1995	\$341,380	+ 169%
2005	\$922,898	+ 0%

These numbers tell an interesting story indeed. What do you think the average sales price will be in 2015? 2025? 2035? We would love to hear your predictions.

The data for 1954, 1975 and 1995 were taken from a sample of data, not the entire list and outliers were thrown out to get an average price of the sample. Should be a close estimate but not exact. 2005 used the entire year data from the MLS. These stats do not take into account inflation, discount rates, and/or opportunities cost.

If you look at the average sold price this 1st quarter of \$910,000 and compare to the average sold price from the first quarter of 2010 of \$1,017,667 - we find that the sold prices this year are off 12% from the same time period a year ago. The declining market that began last half of 2010 is still upon us. The homes are taking longer to sell and for less money than last year. That is not to say that homes are not selling. On the contrary, look at the large list of pendings and backup offers on page 2! The first quarter of 2010 had 15 homes in escrow. This year, the first quarter 2011 has 23 homes in escrow!

2 tablespoons quick cooking tapioca


1 medium onion, chopped

Where Does Mortgage Money Come From

When you close a loan with a mortgage broker, mortgage banker or large institution, you might make payments to the company who originated your loan, or your loan might have been transferred to another institution immediately upon the close of escrow.


The company you make your payments to very rarely owns your loan. They are the "servicer" of your mortgage. They are called the servicer because they are simply "servicing" your loan for the institution that does own it. What happens behind the scenes is that your loan got packaged into a "pool" with a lot of other loans and sold off to one of three institutions: Fannie Mae (FNMA), Freddie Mac (FHLMC) or Ginnie Mae (GNMA). The servicer of your loan gets a monthly fee from the investor for processing payments and taking care of your loan. This fee is usually only 3/8ths of a percent or so, but the amount adds up.

There are companies that service billions of dollars of home loans so the three-eighths of a percent on a billion dollars is not too shabby. In fact, mortgage servicing is where lenders make the real money. The entire system of originating mortgages, including wholesale lenders, mortgage brokers and mortgage bankers is designed so that servicers get loans into their portfolio -- hopefully at a "break even" level -- but often at a loss.

Mortgage servicing is where they make their profit. Once your loan has been packaged into a pool and sold to Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac, or Ginnie Mae, the lender gets additional funds so they can make more loans (to service in their portfolio) and sell to those institutions, so they can get more money, and so on... This is the cycle.

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How do all of the new loan rules affect me? Am I eligible for the higher conforming limits? What are the new credit score requirements? Are all conforming limits the same? Can I still buy or refinance with less than 20% equity?







What's even more delicious than Red Velvet cake? Red Velvet Bread Pudding

Red Velvet Bread Pudding

Ingredients

Red Velvet Cake:

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 pound or 2 sticks butter--let sit till at room temperature
- 2 eggs
- 2 ounces dark red food dye
- 2 1/2 cups cake flour
- 2 tablespoons cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup buttermilk

Bread Pudding Mix:

- 3 cups half-and-half
- 3 large eggs
- 1 large egg yolk
- Pinch salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 8 ounces cream cheese--let sit till at room temperature
- 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar

Directions

Preheat your oven to 350 degrees F. Then grease a 9 by 13 by 2-inch sheet pan.

In a mixing bowl, cream the sugar and butter by beating them together till they are light and fluffy. Add the eggs 1 at a time and mix well after each addition. Mix cocoa and food coloring together and then add to sugar mixture; mix well.

Sift together flour and salt. Add flour mixture to the creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk. Blend in vanilla.

In a small bowl, combine baking soda and add to mixture. Pour red velvet cake batter into the prepared sheet pan. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Remove from heat. Remove from sheet pan

once slightly cooled and then let the cake continue to cool completely. When the cake is cooled, cut into 1-inch cubes. Place cubes onto 11 by 17-inch cookie sheet. Place in oven for 10 minutes.

Bread Pudding Mix:

Combine the half-and-half, eggs, egg yolk, salt, and vanilla in a medium bowl. With an electric hand mixer or processor in a large bowl, beat the cream cheese and sugar until smooth. Mix in the half-and-half mixture.

Place the red velvet cubes in a large baking dish or Pyrex. Another idea would be to make individual servings in 8 individual ramekins. Add the pudding mixture to the dish. Make sure the cake cubes are completely covered. Bake for about 30 minutes, or until the pudding is set.

This recipe combines two of our favorite desserts into one sinfully delicious treat! This recipe will take you a little over an hour to make and it's definitely well worth it. Enjoy!

The Rices - Castle Owners, 124 Via Monte D'Oro

The well known "Reid" house on Via Monte D'Oro-- the first house built in the Riviera by developer Clifford Reid--was bought by the Rices in 1971. Dr. & Mrs. Chandler bought the house from the Reid Estate in 1965 after the passing of the Reids. The Reids lived in "The Castle" for 37 years; the Chandlers for 6 and the Rices for 40. The Rices were the first to raise a family in this famous local landmark.

L'Cena and Bob Rice are locals who grew up in the Rolling Hills/San Pedro area. The couple met while attending Narbonne High. After high school, L'Cena and Bob were called to rival colleges; she to USC and he to UCLA. The Korean War interrupted Bob's studies and he was off to Japan as a Naval Officer. After the war, Bob returned to California and earned a Business Degree at USC and went on to graduate from Loyola Law School. They couple wed after graduating. Bob, now retired, served as House Counsel for Prudential Insurance. L'Cena's studies were in education with a BA & MS degree in .Educational Administration. She retired as Redondo Beach High School Principal in 1983. L'Cena and Bob have been long-time

benefactors and band boosters of their dual alma mater. They are both very involved in .RPV Christ Lutheran Church and School.



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


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
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
