

Point of View Shirley McNair

City owned eucalyptus trees have been allowed to grow so thick and tall that hundreds of homes in the Riviera have lost their view. Many residents believe that the loss of their view is a major issue

Other cities have provisions to protect views:

Proposition M, the View Restoration Ordinance passed by the residents of Rancho Palos Verdes in 1989, has been upheld by the Courts and the city is now putting it into effect.

Alan Fishman, of the Palos Verdes Estates Planning Department, says they allow trimming of city trees to restore or improve views.

Ron Osborne, of Manhattan Beach Public Works Department says their city prohibits city owned vegetation on walk streets from being allowed to grow so large that it obstructs ocean views.

At the February RHA Candidates Meeting, George Nakano, Don Lee and Maureen O'Donnell all said they would support an amendment to the Tree Trimming Ordinance to include trimming city trees to restore views.

Only our Mayor and City Council can address this issue and solve the problem. Their phone number is 618 - 2801. Please contact them if this issue is important to you.


