Progress On View Impairment Ordinance by Glenn Tanner

The City Council heard a presentation from the Streetscape Team and heard input from about 25 residents regarding a proposed View Impairment Policy for City-controlled trees in the Hillside Overlay District. After discussing the various options, the Council voted to adopt a policy that includes the following items:

- All new or replacement street trees and median / park trees will be selected from a list of limited height tree species.
- The current tree trimming permit will be expanded to allow removal of City-controlled trees for view restoration on the applicants frontage with replacement trees

- selected from the list mentioned above.
- The current tree trimming permit will be expanded to allow removal of City-controlled trees for view restoration on someone else's frontage with replacement trees selected from the list mentioned above only if that person agrees.

In addition, the Council directed staff to trim two of the Estrellita Triangle trees during the week of March 10 using an aggressive 'crown reduction' method to see if the trees can be trimmed below the line-of-view that residents whose views are blocked by those trees. Staff will evaluate the experiment and report back to the

Council on April 1. Staff has set up a Streetscape Hot-Line at 310-618-2713 to provide periodic updates regarding this issue. Questions regarding the trimming method may be directed to the Tree Services Administrator, Montey Chamness, at 781-6900. The final policy will not be in effect until the Council takes a final vote.

These actions by the Council are a dramatic shift in policy versus the past years and in fact are the result of the hard working RHA Board members who have promoting this issue for several years. The RHA is committed to pursuing the issue of view impairment in the future and your cooperation, input, and support is encouraged.

Bonds... Torrance School Bonds

Torrance Unified School District (TUSD) is planning on a June 3 vote on an \$80.5 million school bond issue to fund needed improvements and repairs to the schools facilities and infrastructures at 33 campuses. The district proposes to pay back the bonds by forming a Mello Roos District to collect the new property tax. As pointed out in the Daily Breeze article of

March 9, needed improvements and repairs total about \$135 million, but the TUSD has scaled back their request to \$80.5 million.

That breaks down to a cost of about 13 cents per day for a single family homeowner or roughly \$48 per year to pay back the bonds.

After holding a public hearing attended by 150 people, the district voted unanimously voted to form the special district and levy the special tax. The tax must be passed by a two-thirds majority during the vote. Only one resident has formally objected to the creation of the special district. Most of the people gathered at the public hearing overwhelmingly supported the bond issue. Mello Roos bonds may be used for capital projects and new equipment while general bonds are limited to mainly to construction. Trustees pointed out that TUSD receives about \$600 per year less per student than the state average and

\$1800 annually less versus the national average. Therefore there are no funds left for capital improvements.

A strong school district is one of the main assets of a strong community, and TUSD is considered to be a strong district. As one speaker noted... "Torrance attracts young families and they come here for the schools..." A strong school district also upholds and supports higher home resale values. Another speaker summed it up by saying . "I feel an obligation to do for the 21st century students what has already been done for my kids...". The RHA urges you all to carefully consider this issue and vote your conscience on June 3.

Community Emergency Response Team



Mr. Herb Kahn, City Disaster Council Commissioner has written to us requesting support in an effort to allocate funds from the City of Torrance City Council to Support the Community Emergency Response Team, or CERT, program. It is possible that in case of major emergency, the Fire Dept. may not be able to meet the demand for fire and medical services due to a high number of victims, communication failures, and road blockages. Therefore, it is important that citizens who must rely on each other for assistance be as prepared as possible.

The entire CERT course is composed of 7 classes, each 2-1/2 hours.

Preparation would be given in four areas: 1) Information regarding present available immediate services; 2) Inform citizens on their responsibilities for mitigation & preparedness; 3) Train citizens with life-giving and decision making skills; and 4) Organize teams so they may be an extension of the Fire Dept. if needed.

Homeowners associations, such as the RHA have been asked to help by soliciting volunteers from our community to sign petitions requesting the city to fund the CERT courses and to sign up for the program. Special Notice From The TFD

The Torrance Fire Department (TFD) has recently experienced a high number of candle related fires. They have requested that we issue this reminder of a few simple

safety rules for the use of candles:

Never leave candles unattended!!! Before going to bed at night be sure flames are extinguished. Place candles in a sturdy

holder which is designed not to allow the melted wax to overflow or carry the lighted wick to another location. Always supervise children around any

open flame. Remember, the heat from the flame rises so do not place any combustible material above the candle. Have working smoke detectors and a current, practiced, escape plan for your

family.

Schedule Of Upcoming City Public Works Projects by Glenn Tanner

The City of Torrance Engineering Department has just released an update of the public works capital improvement program for 1997. Citywide, the program consists of multiple projects totaling \$47 million in improvements. The following areas in the Hollywood Riviera will be affected during 1997:

- Slurry seal repaying of all streets west of Palos Verdes Blvd.
- Total resurfacing of street pavement on Camino de las Colinas between Calle Mayor and PCH.
- Calle Mayor booster pump station

replacement (Calle Mayor at PCH), Spring 1997.

- Traffic Signal Pre-emption system installation at Anza and PCH.
- New City entry signs at Hawthorne and the south City limit.
- Sewer main and storm drain line replacements on Paseo de Gracia between Via los Altos & Via Linda Vista; Via El Chico; Via Atezeta between Via los Miradores and Paseo de Arena; Calle Miramar between Via Estrellas and Calle Mayor; Via los Tortugas between Vista Montana and Mesa St.; and Bluff St.
