Our financial and membership performance this year is strong. We are on track to meet our budgeted revenue targets. RHA expenditures have remained in line with the approved budget all year long and we expect to close out the year within budget. It has been a personal goal of mine to improve our accountability and transparency as an organization. I believe that, as a result of the efforts or our Treasurer and VP of Membership, we are doing just that.

The RHA has presented a number of interesting and topical general meetings this year. In October, City Council members Hope Witkowsky and Ted Lieu participated in a panel discussion of "Development in the City of Torrance". They were joined by Doug Maupin of Maupin Development, the developer

In our last general meeting, Jim Osborne, Public Works Department, came to speak about city regulations and practices for trimming and removing trees. Ted Semaan, from the Planning Dept., and Scott Gobble, from Southern California Electric, spoke about the process of undergrounding utilities.

Our Holiday concert was the most successful ever with a standing room only crowd taking in the Holiday sights and sounds of performing groups from Riviera Elementary, Richardson Middle School and South High. Apparently Riviera kids were "nice" this year as evidenced by Santa's appearance at the end of the concert to pass out Holiday treats to the kids.

Our Concert in the Park is getting bigger every year. It is a great opportunity to meet more of your neighbors and enjoy live music in our beautiful El Retiro Park setting. Mark your calendars now for our next Concert in the Park. We schedule it for the first weekend after school starts in September.

We will continue our tradition of providing college scholarships to deserving Riviera residents. Last year we gave out \$2,000 in the form of \$500 scholarships to four outstanding Riviera students. We are budgeted to do

the same this year.

I believe that we have executed well on our responsibility to protect our neighborhood from any negative influences from within or outside of the city. We worked closely with neighbors to influence the scale and design of the Vagabond project. In the end, our efforts helped to influence the developer to redesign his plans to better align with Riviera community concerns around traffic flow, building height and scale.

In the same way, our participation in the coalition of the Torrance Homeowners Association Presidents helped to influence the City Council to reconsider its development project approval pattern. They ultimately passed a temporary development moratorium to signal their recognition of community concern of the rate and shape of development within the City.

RHA participation in that coalition had a moderating effect on the group's dialogue and ultimately resulted in a more balanced statement to the City Council. I was particularly honored to be chosen to deliver our joint statement to the Council during the meeting where the moratorium was being considered.

Looking ahead, I am heartened by the response to our call for new RHA board

members. Our board will have as many as four new members this upcoming season. This is a gratifying legacy for each board at the end of our year. It shows that others are supportive enough of our efforts as to want to join the cause.

GENERAL MEETING



At our February 16, 2005 General Meeting, the RHA was fortunate to have representatives of the City of Torrance and Southern California Edison to share information on the process to underground utilities in residential neighborhoods.

An underground utility assessment district can be established for as few as 30 homes or a few street blocks within neighborhood. It is truly a grass roots effort that directly involves individual homeowners and neighbors working together to make it happen. The process starts with individual homeowners canvassing their neighborhood and gathering signatures of homeowners that express an interest in having electric, telephone, and cable utilities undergrounded. If at least 60 % of homeowners express an interest in undergrounding utilities in a defined area, the city will perform a study to estimate the cost of undergrounding utilities for each individual homeowner. Homeowner's then cast ballots in an election to approve establishing an underground utilities assessment district to pay for undergrounding as an added fee on their property tax bill over a period of up to 20 years. If 50 % or more of the homeowners in a defined assessment district approve the ballot measure, the undergrounding project proceeds. Also at the meeting, Jim Osborne of the City of Torrance discussed tree trimming. The City trims trees that are on City property. Individual neighbors need to work with each other regarding tree trimming on private property. The City will recommend qualified tree service companies. There was considerable discussion about forming a subcommittee to consider development of a City ordinance regarding tree trimming and view preservation. NEIGHBORHOOD POTHOLE PROBLEMS?

Did you notice all of the rain this winter? Just kidding! With this year's record amounts of rainfall, the City of Torrance has experienced a huge increase in new potholes. According to the Torrance Public Works Department, potholes are created when water seeps into cracks in the roadway, weakening the subsurface. The additional stresses caused by traffic can lead to a local surface failure: the proverbial car-mangling pothole. Austin Woodward 1925 – 2005

Austin Woodward, passed away March 8th of congestive heart failure. The RHA and our larger community has lost a great friend.

During the past year, Austin had been cataloging the considerable quantity of the

Association's historical archives in preparation for its installation at the Torrance Historical Society. The intention is for the Historical Society to provide safekeeping of the Association's archives, while making it available to residents for viewing, or research. It was a pleasure for Austin to peruse the accumulated lore and minutiae of the Association, and recollect his own involvement in so much of its past. He was a paragon of civic participation, a model for citizen involvement in his community and the wider world. As editors of the RHA newsletters in the early 70's, he and his wife, Rosalie, imbued the Association's correspondence with wit, charm, and a sense of purpose. More recently we had gotten to know Austin as a wise mentor, with the kind of inspired advice leavened with practical experience. Austin, you left us too soon, there is still work to be done.



The current Riviera Rainfall to date is 28.03 inches. That's twice the normal rainfall for the year! We are running about 5 inches less than the official rainfall for Los Angeles. It rained 8 days in February for a total of more than 7.5 inches. During one lightening storm (2/18/05) several transformers were destroyed and power was cut off in several districts. The lightening storm started at 1:30 am and lasted for about one hour with very close strikes (one thousand o..) and thunder to match. It seemed like everyone woke up to watch except for my neighbors' kids. If only I could sleep that soundly.

Our understanding is that a storm later this week should help break the Los Angeles rainfall season record. We'll let you know the final results in a later report this year. In the meantime, go out to the desert and enjoy the wild flowers. I hear that they are the best in years.

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LANDSCAPE AWARDS



Audrey Marsee, at 358 Camino de las Colinas, graciously accepted the February Outstanding Landscape Award on behalf of the Stuart Marsee Family. Stuart was President of El Camino College for many years and served with distinction and many honors. The Marsee Family has been here since 1958 and lived all that time with a non-descript ivy slope.

Now there is a brand new and very unique, water-wise and low maintenance landscape designed by Sandy Fields, with winding paths of flagstone interspersed with clumps of Mexican Feather Grass, moving gently in the ever present Riviera breeze, Lavender, and Senecio Madrilense, a lush gray/green ground cover. Other plants are Blue Hibiscus, Armeria, Dusty Miller and Society Garlic.



Louise and Michael deCastro of 4410 Paseo de las Tortugas received the Outstanding Landscape Award for March on behalf of their family.

This is a really lovely landscape with sweetly curving borders that are lushly filled with Lobelia, Camellias, Pansies, variegated and non-variegated Pittosporum, Princess Flower, Pink and White Marguerites, Australian Tea Tree, Primroses, Ferns, Freesias, Lavender, Hydrangeas and anchored by stately Birch trees. These gentle borders were laid out by Louise deCastro and the landscape installation was done by Beautiful Landscapes in Long Beach.
