Also, please take time to read the RHA board's position on the upcoming Torrance Unified bond measure (Measure T). The board has voted to support this increase in property taxes to fund TUSD school's facilities modernization..

I for one see this as the last resort. The problem of deteriorating school properties has not been addressed by politicians representing us at the local, county and state level. I have repeatedly heard that Torrance has been "ripped off" by 1970s-era legislation that takes money from our city and re-distributes it disproportionately to other school districts based on formulas that are not fair and have not been adjusted in decades.

Shame on those who have been elected to represent our interests. Why have the taxpayers of this City had to bear this burden as our schools are disintegrating? We are clearly not being served by those who represent us. I plan to take my frustrations out at the ballot box this June. If you are an incumbent at the state, county or local level and have not addressed this issue, you will not get my vote. ample of waste is the \$23 million in taxpayer dollars spent to "educate" voters on the need to pass another bond to provide state taxpayer paid universal preschool (Sacramento Bee, March 14, 2006).

This money was spent by the state commission set up to oversee the Prop 10 school bond money voters approved in 1998 spending . Taxpayers should not be paying for this type of campaign. That money could be put to use on school infrastructure. This is the same crowd that is telling us that we do not spend enough on our schools. I resent having my tax

dollars spent to tell me that I do not send enough of my tax dollars to the state.

That being said, we are now in a critical situation with our school properties in Torrance. I tend to trust local bond oversight much more than I do those folks in LA County or Sacramento.

RHA BOARD SUPPORTS TUSD'S BOND MEASURE (MEASURE "T")

Measure T is the Torrance Unified School District's proposed bond measure to modernize all TUSD school campuses. If passed, Hollywood Riviera neighborhood schools will receive nearly \$40 million to pay for badly needed facilities upgrades. A few highlights of scheduled projects include:

- upgrading electrical and telecommunications systems
- renovating and/or replacing aging classrooms, restrooms and other facilities
- updating fire and smoke alarm systems, windows, exterior plaster, paint and roofs
- repaving of all hard surfaces and play areas
- new science labs (Richardson) and updated library facilities

The RHA board endorses
this measure & encourages
Hollywood Riviera residents
to support Measure T

Riviera Elementary is earmarked for \$4.7 million, Richardson Middle School \$5.6 million and South High \$28.4 million. The cost for Measure T is not to exceed \$60 per \$100,000 assessed property value (not market value) per year.

The RHA board endorses this measure and encourages Hollywood Riviera residents do their own research (links provided in this article) and support Measure T on June 6th or by absentee ballot. The key reasons we support the TUSD modernization efforts are: (1) TUSD infrastructure upgrades will bring our school facilities up to par with surrounding South Bay communities (who in many cases have passed multiple bond measures in recent years to upgrade their facilities), (2) Modernization will help maintain TUSD's position as a top school district in California, and, (3) Our cash-strapped and under-funded school district has no other sufficient means of accomplishing such an extensive and badly-needed modernization.

PROPOSED OVERSIZED VEHICLE PARKING RESTRICTIONS

For nearly a year, the Torrance City Council has wrestled with defining a new ordinance to address recreational vehicle, trailer and other oversized vehicle parking on city streets. The goals of the proposed ordinance are to: (1) Increase traffic safety—Oversized vehicles and trailer parking on residential streets impede traffic, especially on narrow streets. They also create visual obstacles that reduce sightlines, reducing safety for motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists, (2) Improve community esthetics and livability— Simply stated, oversized vehicles are eyesores.

The current Torrance parking regulation – TMC 61.6.4, the 72 hour parking limit – is easily skirted and it is very easy for oversized vehicle owners for park on city streets indefinitely. To address this parking issue, the Torrance Traffic Commission is proposing a permit system that limits on-street parking for oversized vehicles. The key elements to the proposed ordinance (as of March 28, 2006) are: (1) Oversized Vehicle Parking Permit (OVPP), good for 24 hours, is required to park an oversized vehicle on a city street,(2) For oversized vehicles registered with the City, applicants may request no more than 3 consecutive OVPPs (a total of 72 hours of parking to load and unload) at one time, and no more than 24 OVPPs within any 90 day period (about 96 OVPPs per year), (3) For out-of-town visitors (vehicles not registered with the City), applicants may request no more than 14 consecutive OVPPs at one time, and no more than 30 OVPPs per calendar year.

Current oversized vehicle owners who register their vehicles with the City by end of year will receive an OVPP that allows them to be "grandfathered" to prior municipal codes. Except for the "grandfathering" provision, the RHA board is in favor of the proposed oversized vehicle parking restrictions. We agree with the Traffic Commission's goals of increased traffic safety and improved community esthetics and livability.
