Whether you support or are opposed to the school bonds is your own business but, as a taxpayer and citizen, you owe it to yourself to learn everything you can about a proposition on which you are asked to vote.

The Educational Affairs Committee of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce strongly recommends a "Yes" vote on the bonds. They feel the bonds will pass if the voters are provided with the facts. Other supporters of the bonds claim that our Torrance School buildings can be financed by a time-payment plan with bonds without increasing the tax rete for bond interest and redemption. They state this is possible because the district is retiring old bonds at the same rate new ones would be issued.

The February 2nd, meeting should be one of our most interesting of the year.
