The property in question is the bluff area immediately above the old Club House steps at Paseo de la Playa and The Esplanade-Calle Miramar. Please help. The beach and bluff you save is yours. Gravel-Pit Rezoning: Public Hearings April 7 and April 21.

A zone-change request has been filed in the Torrance Planning Department for 117 acres of hillside property above Walteria known as the Chandler Sand and Gravel Pit. William McKown, project supervisor for developers Barclay, Hollander and Curci, is asking a change of zone from R-1 (single-family residential) to R-3 (apartment) on 73.5 acres and to RTH (residential townhouse) on 38.6 acres. The request includes 4.8 acres to be rezoned for commercial use.

Based on allowed densities under the R-3 and RTH zones and on 1967 population factors the development would consist of 3,660 to 3,780 units with a population of 7,000 to 8,000.

The Walteria Homeowners Association is preparing an opposition campaign and has asked the backing of other homeowner groups. It is hoped that all residents will view the proposal in terms of the probable impact of such a population increase in a relatively confined section. What effect will several thousand more people and their automobiles have on our schools, traffic, shopping centers and available recreation facilities? How important to the city and the area is the preservation of remaining open space?

These questions each of us should ask. The answers will be an indication of the quality of life here ten years hence. The Planning Commission hearings are for you. Be at Torrance City Council Chambers, 7:00 p.m. April 7, and be heard!

Iceplant Nemesis

Unloved and untended, nevertheless it is iceplant that holds our hills together in many places. Something has been killing great patches of the succulent lately, posing the threat of eventual erosion. Our best information indicates that spittlebugs (their name is enough to make identity) are guilty of the devastation. Malathion is effective in killing spittlebugs and is acceptable from a conservation point of view.

The markers are used on valuable items which have no serial numbers or other means of positive identification. They may be used without charge through the Torrance Police Department's property room.
