Issues and Information of Importance to the Riviera

### TORRANCE AIRPORT

The Torrance airport is often the target of complaints by Riviera residents because of its production of noise, and the hazards associated with exceptionally low-flying aircraft. The potential problems of the airport, should large scale expansion bring in larger, more powerful aircraft, are also of concern. The fate of homeowners in residential areas adjacent to growing airports has, in general, not been happy, as the problems with the north runway at Los Angeles International demonstrated. On the other hand, general and light executive aircraft fields, such as Torrance is now, represent a city-run 'business' which provides revenue, a base for local business, center for recreational and business flying for the area. Special affairs such as the recent air show provide entertainment for aviation fans as well. The objective of the Riviera Homeowners, through its airport committee, is to/provide a voice of community interest in airport affairs and to influence the city administration's decisions in matters which bear on the airport's relationship to the Riviera. The position of the RHA board, representing the membership, has generally been to support the airport in its present role as a general aviation field, while at the same time attempting to reduce noise and safety problems. The position represents a balance between outright closure and expansion into commercial service.

The city, through the airport commission and the airport manager, Jack Egan, has been cooperative in informing the community about airport affairs and allowing its participation in debates over airport affairs. The principal problems, common to almost all citysurrounded airports, are noise and safety. Legislation directed at the noise problem has so far had relatively little effect because of the federal pre-emption of aviation affairs through the FAA. tower at Torrance, for example, is FAA operated, and flight operations are directed by them. This fact explains why flight-pattern problems cannot be worked out solely by the city-run airport office. The city, however, does have a marginal control over operations through the granting of licenses to sell fuel and other services. The safety problem centers around planes landing over and turning into the hillside at levels below safe operating height. There is no question that pilots do this, but in so doing they are operating outside the prescribed patterns: the FAA and the airport administration have agreed to emphasize to the pilots the need for attention to the pattern.

The airport commission has recently been active in trying to communicate with the residents of the surrounding areas in airport-related affairs. A committee has been set up by the airport commission to study the 'touch and go' question: whether restriction of operations would make sense. The stand against large-scale expansion of the airport, assuming the current aircraft types would be used (that is, more nower equals more noise), we feel is still correct and that view appears to be supprted in city government. By continuing to present to the city our views on the airport in a balanced manner, we can retain the quality of Riviera living while retaining too the services of the Torrance airport for the city as a whole. ### OF INTEREST IN THE RIVIERA

Torrance City Council has declared a 90 day moritorium on new construction on Vista Montana pending study of hillside development by the planning commission and the council. Major concern has been expressed over the nossible creation of a serious traffic hazard if, as the builder has planned, there were driveway access onto Montana.

The controversial Torrance freeway alternate routes have become an issue once again. The city traffic department has promised to keep us posted on new developments and supplied with pertinent information.

Did you know that if you can gather a group of fifteen or twenty people the police department will send an officer to discuss and answer questions about any phase of police work in which the group might be interested?

Another police community relations program residents might want to take advantage of: You can arrange to ride along with a policeman in a patrol car as he answers an evening's worth of calls. Joe Clukey did this recently and recommends it to everyone. He reports being very favorably impressed with the tact and ability of the officer he accompanied.
