OIL DRILLING - NEEDS VS. ENVIRONMENT?




What's in store for the Southern California area as plans are formulated for tapping offshore oil deposits? Is the issue as simple as weighing empty gas tanks vs. oil-covered beaches, or are there more factors involved in determining whether or not (and where) offshore drilling ought to be done.

To present a balanced picture of the oil issue as it affects the Riviera and the Southern California area, RHA presents a discussion on the issue by Mr. Juan Forster, Vice-President of Wholesale Marketing of Douglas Oil Company of Costa Mesa.

Mr. Forester will review the petroleum industry's goals and priorities in the drilling programs, and will answer your questions on potential environmental impact and industry programs to ensure safe oil production in the coastal areas.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Numbers - engineers are thought to be infatuated with them, but let's think about what they can mean to the Riviera. ONE, for example. What will be the Number One problem for the Riviera and your association this year? Every year seems to bring up one problem of major and overwhelming significance to the community. Sometimes it's a predictable thing, such as protection of the beach recreation area, or airport development. On the other hand, sometimes the problem is on us with little or no warning, and the association must act quickly to protect the interests of the community. Whatever "Problem 1975" turns out to be, you can count on the RHA to act in your best interests, but in return you should recognize that the association is only as strong as the membership.

Some other numbers of significance: 400 - that's about the current number of families already members for this year. 3000 - but that's the number of newsletters we distribute to the area. Hence, only about one family in seven is an active member. Think how much more weight the association views would carry if half, or more, of the area residents were members. Thus, try asking your neighbors on either side if they've joined and if not, steer them to our membership chairman. It's also a good way to meet the neighbors. Remember, the time to boost the membership is while the major problems still lie ahead of us, not when they hit us with little advance notice. The bigger the association is the better we can obtain the needed attention from city and other official agencies.
